

No Changes in 2026 to Goldwater's:

Mission

• To identify, encourage, and financially support this Nation's next generation of research leaders in STEM.

Level of Financial Support

• Sophomores up to \$15,000, Juniors up to \$7,500

Eligibility Requirements

Fields of Study

Determines background of reviewers who read applications

Application Elements

Online application, transcripts, 3 letters, research essay

New for 2026

Three AI Questions:

- Was an AI Tool used in this application?
- What AI tool was used?
- How was Al used to prepare your Goldwater application?

Student answers to these questions **WILL** be provided to the reviewers in 2026.

Changes over the past 6 years

Doubled the number of scholarships in 2019

Review by discipline, not by state

Transfer and Veteran Student Initiatives

• A 5th student can be nominated if one or more of your nominees is a transfer student or a veteran. A 6th student can be nominated if a transfer student AND a veteran are nominated.

Students who transfer to an accredited 2- and 4year U.S. academic institution may still be nominated by the school FROM which they transferred.

In the year nominated, students do NOT have to be enrolled full-time but must be enrolled full-time during academic terms they receive funding.

Changes over the past 6 years

Selection Process



Files are reviewed holistically

 Balanced consideration of review categories, with selection based on merit, not financial need.

Review Areas (rubric)

- 1) Career goals, 2) research essay/research experience,
 - 3) academic course of study and performance,
 - 4) reference letters, and 5) other considerations

How Nominations are Distributed among Reviewers

- A packet of 30 nominations is read by a two-person review team
 - Select 6-7 Scholars team members must agree
 - Select 2 nominees for additional review team members must agree
 - A reviewer may identify 1 student for "Diamond" (hidden gem) consideration at the Foundation level.

What does Diamond signify?

Enables reviewers to "level the playing field" – i.e., account for the fact that all students don't have the same opportunities.

Diamonds are expected to exhibit ability, promise, and interest in a research career, but due to various life challenges, they do not have the same level of productivity/experience as other applicants.

Some characteristics that *MIGHT* lead a reviewer to designate a student as a Diamond: Low-income, first-generation, non-traditional, community college, health challenges, homelessness, among others.

Diamond is an internal designation only. Once selected, a GOLDWATER SCHOLAR is a GOLDWATER SCHOLAR!


CRs should NOT be reluctant to nominate applicants who have faced life challenges but who have persevered and show promise and ability to pursue a research career.

Diamond is NOT a NOMINATION category;
Diamond is a REVIEW category

What makes an application more competitive?

There is no single "recipe" for winning a Goldwater Award

What are the characteristics of a strong application?

- Well articulated career goals (details add credibility)
- Academic accomplishments that support career trajectory
- Research that identifies students' intellectual contributions and skills
- Letters that speak to ability, promise, and research career direction
- Evidence that students have made the most of the opportunities available to them
